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## Governance by Evaluation: Institutional Capacities and Learning for Sustainable Development

In the last 20 years sustainable development has evolved from a vague vision into a set of basic principles, guiding decisions and actions on various levels. As a consequence decision makers in the public and the private sector are calling for reliable information about whether or not policies, programmes and projects support sustainable development. The only solid way of generating this information is through professional evaluation, based on scientifically tested concepts and methods.

In recent years a number of innovative methods and new areas of work have emerged, such as strategic environmental assessments, impact assessments, peer reviews, systems evaluations, theory-based evaluations and participatory approaches. These new developments confront both contractors and evaluators with new methodological and practical challenges. Coping with these challenges requires institutional capacity building and learning on both an individual and an organizational level. These are the issues which are the focus of the EASY-ECO Vienna Conference 2008. It will present a broad variety of research findings, evaluation concepts and case studies on institutional aspects, policy learning and methodological innovations in evaluating sustainable development.



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Since 2002 we have been coordinating the EU-project "EASY-ECO - Evaluation of Sustainability" (funded within FP5 and FP6). It aims to train young researchers, increase market transparency, build capacities in the corresponding field and facilitate networking among scientists, evaluators and clients. So far, five major conferences and four training courses have taken place. The involvement of more than 300 outstanding academics, very good feedback from 200 trainees and a book series on evaluating sustainable development show the success of this series. Consequently, the German UNESCO commission acknowledged EASY-ECO as an official project of the UN Decade for Education for Sustainable Development (2005-2014). The United Nations Environment Programme, SkyEurope and Kommunalkredit Public Consulting support this series of events.

Let me also thank our Austrian supporters, the Federal Ministry for Agriculture, Forestry, Environment and Water Management, the Federal Ministry of Science and Research, and the City of Vienna.

In order to meet the growing interest and demand of young researchers, the EASY-ECO series will continue until 2010, offering six more training courses (Germany, Sweden, Spain, Italy, Czech Republic and Estonia) and two Euro-Conferences scheduled for Budapest 2009 and for Brussels 2010. About 600 academics, practitioners and young researchers from all over Europe are expected to participate in this series of events.

It is a pleasure to welcome the EASY-ECO series in Vienna, where it was designed seven years ago and where it started in 2002. As the initiator and coordinator I am happy to welcome you to four days of outstanding presentations, interesting discussions and valuable possibilities for exchange and networking.

## The venue and hotels

The main entrance of the university is accessible via the stairs in front of the tram station Liechtenwerderplatz (tram line D). The **registration desk** can be found in the first upper floor in block B (use stairs on the right hand side of the porter's lodge).

The **EPOS-network meeting** and **EASY-ECO 2008-2010 kick-off meeting (both on invitation only)** will take place in building UZA4: To arrive at the UZA4 from one of the EASY-ECO partner hotels use the public stairway on the left hand-side from the post office in Althanstrasse 10.



## Public transport in Vienna

### Tickets for public transport throughout Vienna (Vienna travel zone 100)

Various ticket options are available from the Vienna Public Transport Authorities. Tickets can be bought in the Vienna Transport Authority's ticket offices, from tobacconists, online and from vending machines in the stations (most of them providing English instructions and credit card payment).

We recommend you to buy a **"72 hours Vienna"**-ticket as soon as you arrive at one of the train stations in Vienna. The ticket is valid throughout Vienna for exactly 72 hours from the time it is punched and will cover your travel before and during the conference and the social programme. The ticket costs €13,60.

Tickets bought in advance must be punched in a blue ticket cancelling machine in the tram or bus or at the barrier before you board the underground train.

### **Public transport after midnight**

From 00:30 until 05:00, night buses (N) run at half-hour intervals on 22 lines, with Schwedenplatz as the hub. The 72 hours Vienna-ticket is also valid for nightline buses.

### **Returning to the airport**

- by train with the commuter rail line ("Schnellbahn") S7. Trains leave from Wien Mitte every 25 and 55 minutes after the full hour. Travel time: 24 minutes from Wien Mitte
  - by City Airport Train (CAT), leaving from Wien Mitte every 8 and 38 minutes after the full hour.
  - by bus from Vienna Airport Lines, leaving from train station Südbahnhof every 30 minutes.

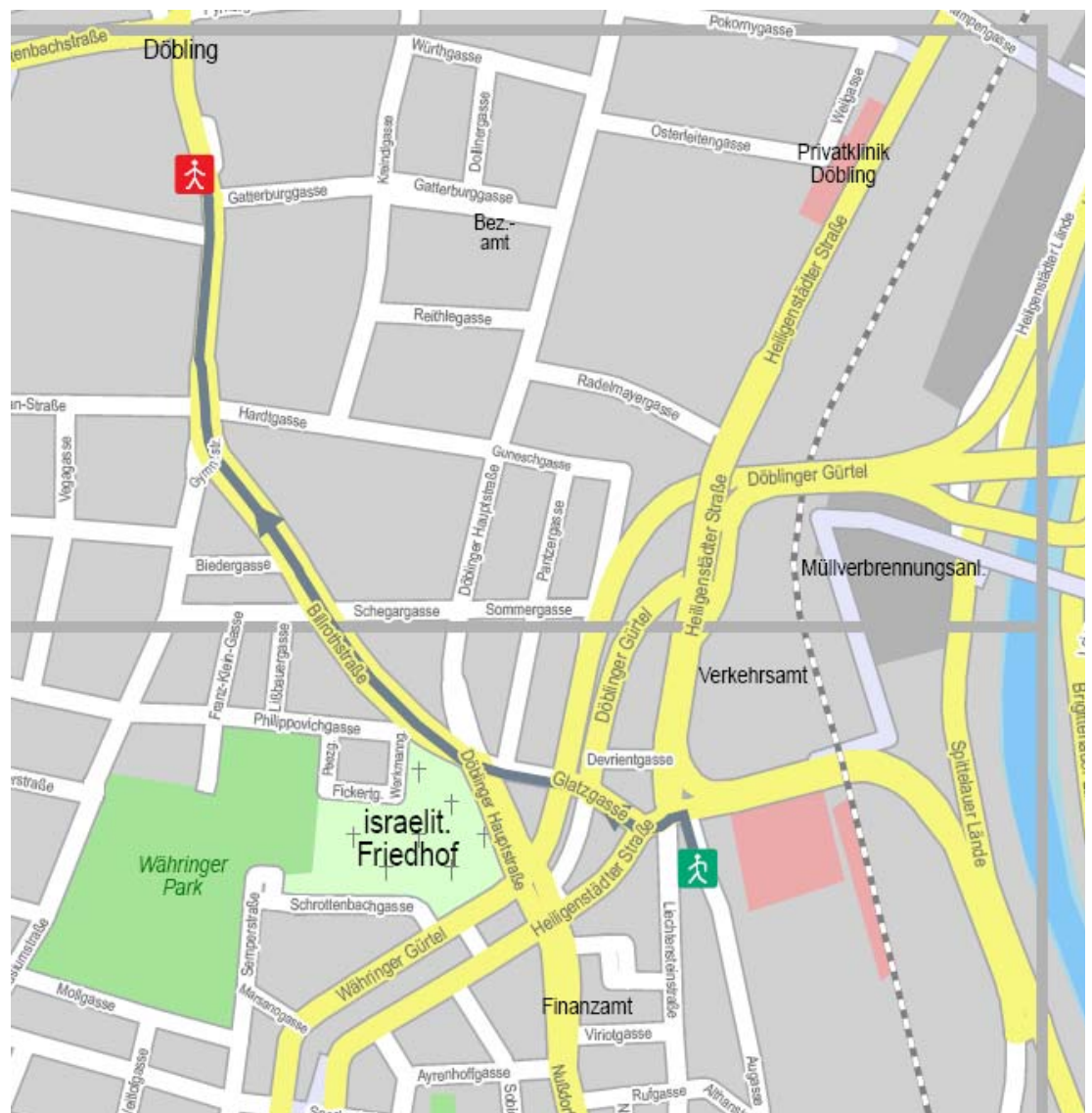

The location is a 15-minute walk from the university; alternatively you can take a tram (line 38) and get off at stop "Gatterburggasse".



## Available excursions (Thursday, 16:00)

*In case you have not pre-reserved a place, please get your ticket for the excursions from the registration desk throughout Wednesday and Thursday morning.*

1 - EXPLORING VIENNA: This tour is a walking tour through the City Centre to see St. Stephen's Cathedral, pass the Imperial Palace and the State Opera. We will also see places where Mozart lived, Empress Sisi dined and Johann Strauß waltzed.

2 - VIENNA FOR INSIDERS: You think you already know the city? Let us take you into the hidden parts of the city, along cobble-stoned streets, into hidden court-yards and the medieval quarter of the City called Greek or Old University Quarter.

3 - THE SPITTELAU WASTE-INCINERATING PLANT: Once a repugnant piece of architecture, the plant has become a must-see for Vienna tourists after its transformation by artist Friedensreich Hundertwasser into a psychedelic creation with a dazzling gold tower. This tour will also give you a behind-the-scenes look at a waste processing plant.

4 - THE JEWISH VIENNA: There have been Jewish communities in Vienna since the 13th century. This tour is intended to give an overview of the eventful and often very tragic Jewish history of the city. We tell you about Jewish life in the city from its earliest beginnings, the medieval synagogue as well as the early 19th-century City Temple, the destruction of Jewish life in Vienna as well as its re-birth. You will also see the Jewish Textile Quarter around Rudofplatz, the Gestapo, Simon Wiesental's Vienna and the new Holocaust Memorial on Judenplatz.

5 - MOZART IN VIENNA: On this tour you will learn about the most important aspects of Mozart's years in Vienna, his professional successes, his mixing in Viennese society and his private life. To illustrate this we will wind our way through streets and courtyards passing the house where the brilliant composer spent his happiest years in imperial Vienna and where his opera "The Marriage of Figaro" originated.

### If this is your first time visit in Vienna

If the weather allows, take a walk along the "Ringstrasse" and "Kärntnerstrasse" to see some of the most important buildings of the city. Don't forget to stop and have a rest in one of the typical Viennese coffeehouses (e.g. Café Demel - Kohlmarkt 14; Café Landtmann - Dr. Karl Lueger Ring 4).

Two of the major imperial sites of the city are Schönbrunn Palace (can be reached with underground line U4) and the Hofburg in the city centre. In case of bad weather, the Viennese museums such as the Upper Belvedere (with the world's largest Klimt collection), Albertina (with its famous graphic collection) and Kunsthhaus (the home for the work of Hundertwasser) offer a delightful alternative.
